Foreword

In our combined 40 year history, Safe Steps has grown and developed to meet the changing needs of our area.

We have become the lead domestic abuse service provider in Southend, reaching 8000 people each year through emergency accommodation, advocacy, recovery, child and family services, helpline, counselling, community prevention and awareness and training.

Our current position is in part due to the vision of local survivors of domestic abuse who set up Southend's first women's refuge, later becoming Southend Women's Aid in 1976. We would like to thank SOS Domestic Abuse Projects (formerly Southend Women's Aid) for their innovation and guidance which has helped to establish Safe Steps.

We recognise the importance and strengths that come from partnership working, we are one of the three founding members of the EVIE (Ending Violence in Essex) Partnership together with Changing Pathways and The Next Chapter.

Our 3 Year Strategic Plan aims to strengthen and deepen our impact as an organisation that has experienced tremendous growth since its launch in 2018; enhance our accessibility; and invest in our essential infrastructure.

The goals laid out in this plan will allow us to further our mission by meeting the needs of victims while also participating in transformative change that will support Southend, Essex and Thurrock respond to the requirements of the Domestic Abuse Act 2021.

Our purpose and impact

We are a specialist provider, delivering services in Southend, Essex and Thurrock. We offer a range of community and accommodation services to support adults, young people and children recover and rebuild their lives after domestic abuse. We have become the lead domestic abuse service provider in Southend, **reaching 8000 people each year** through emergency accommodation, advocacy, recovery, child and family services, helpline, counselling, community prevention and awareness and training.

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

Our clients

The people we serve will experience an approach that is trauma informed, respectful of their individual needs and understanding of intersectionality in a trusting safe environment.

When clients face an intersection of challenges such as poverty, disability, mental health issues, addiction, homelessness, immigration status and a language barrier, their vulnerability can be significantly increased. A significant proportion of Safe Steps clients face one or more of these challenges.

We are committed to seeking out and listening to feedback about service delivery from our clients and partners, and to modifying our model, processes and practices accordingly.

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We will do this by;

Increasing the visibility and accessibility of Safe Steps for all sections of our community through our community premises, varied colocation sites and online.

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Making sure that our support is truly inclusive. Actively seeking feedback and meaningful participation from survivors to understand and remove any barriers to accessing our services, design more engaging, effective and equitable services for people who need them most.

Investing in domestic abuse specialist training and learning opportunities for our staff to improve their responses and practical approaches when working with survivors from marginalised sections of our community and create more opportunities for people from marginalised communities to shape our work.

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In 2022–2023 48% of survivors we supported told us they had a mental health need.

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In 2022–2023 for I in 10 of the clients we supported, English was their second language.

In 2022-2023

19% of survivors were in unsecure accommodation when they approached us for support

Our services

We are already one of the few services in the UK that provides a beginning to end service for survivors and their children. From crisis to recovery, for children, young people and adults, we provide support in community and in safe accommodation. We raise awareness in schools and train professionals building capacity in the local community.

We will develop our existing life changing services and create new in response to identified unmet support needs of survivors experiencing, or at risk of, domestic abuse.

This will be achieved by;

Ensuring we constantly deliver high quality, needs led, trauma and evidence informed services.

Increasing the opportunities and platforms to actively consult with survivors and stakeholders in the review of our services.

We'll use the expertise and experience of survivors to design and develop a range of recovery focused interventions for adults and children.

IDVA support has been my go-to and helped through the whole situation. With your support, I was able to take positive steps to not be in the situation anymore. I wouldn't have been able to get through it especially going to court. I have referred other people to Safe Steps based on my own experience and I understand the full impact on my children more than I did before.

Our partnerships

We'll work to increase the opportunities and platforms to amplify stories and voices of survivors and children.

We'll continue to develop the success of the EVIE Partnership, a consortium of Essex Domestic Abuse Support Services, to increase our voice and influence locally and regionally.

EVIE (Ending Violence in Essex) is a consortium of three domestic abuse specialist providers in Essex, as a collective we provide services in all 14 districts of Essex that can be accessed through the COMPASS helpline and gateway service. By sharing specialist expertise, skills and resources we are able to increase the resilience of our collective services and ensure that survivors have access to a wide-range of specialist services dependent on their needs. Our shared approach ensures that all survivors of domestic abuse are provided with a consistent, high-guality, needs-led service which is informed by our collective knowledge of the local area in which we deliver.

Through a comprehensive learning and development framework for all trainees, staff and managers, we will invest in the workforce enabling us to 'grow our own' talent.

Supporting children and young people



<u>Children are not passive</u> <u>witnesses</u>

Our vision is to achieve a brighter future free from domestic abuse and for our community, that needs to start with the youngest and often most vulnerable people.

It is important to spotlight the specialist work we do with children and young people at Safe Steps. Our 3YR Strategy focuses on how we will work with all our clients and survivors, but we feel it is essential to draw particular <u>attention to</u> children and young people. Being exposed to domestic abuse has serious consequences for children and young people; it can affect how they feel, think and behave in harmful ways. It can have significant impact on a child's development, health and wellbeing.

Children are not passive witnesses, a position we have always held, the law now states they are direct victims.

I liked that I was able to speak about different things and [my worker] would listen and then give me options and this really helped with making good choices, it made me feel I was happy and confident with these choices. **Sophie, aged 15**

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I liked meeting new friends, knowing that they had been through similar experiences. Also being given ideas to help calm down. I liked the games we played and we play this a lot at home now, I like it. Manny, aged 11

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I felt listened to and like I had a safe place to off load how I felt without fear of it being spread around the school. **Chloe, aged 16**

What we do;

Dedicated Early Years IDVAs working with families who are pregnant or have an under 5yr in the home.

Our Break the Cycle project has increased support not only for pupils but for parent, teachers and other school staff. We've built close links with Essex University and Southend based colleges, helping students identify unhealthy relationships and access support for their own, and that of their peers, safety.

A full range of domestic abuse recovery programmes and 1-1 support for the child or young person and non-abusing parent delivered by our pioneering Fledglings team.

Specialist CYP IDVA team for victims of domestic abuse aged 13-19yrs.

Coordinated programme of support for children and young people in Safe Accommodation, continuing into their resettlement. Specialist counselling by a team of BACP accredited, and clinically supervised, Counsellors.

The 5 main focuses of Safe Steps Strategy; our people, our clients, our services, our organisation and our partnerships will build on our extensive knowledge and experience taking the needs of children and young people into account. A spotlight of 3 of these priorities;

- We'll create more opportunities for young people to shape and influence our services and statutory responses, amplifying their stories and voices.
- How children and young people access our support will be varied, we'll increase the platforms for engagement, working proactively to identify 'hidden victims'.
- We'll continue to work in collaboration with our partners to achieve consistent pathways to specialist domestic abuse support for children and young people.
